

CONNECTING GLENDALE 2020

BICYCLE AND PEDESTRIAN PLAN



1. MILWAUKEE RIVER PARKWAY

Milwaukee River Parkway offers a scenic, low-traffic route through the heart of Glendale that is perfect for bicyclists and pedestrians. The lush green boulevard transports you from the urban street environment to Glendale's parks and trails.

2. RICHARD E. MASLOWSKI PARK

Glendale's newest community park, Maslowski Park is a regional destination bringing families and visitors to its exciting events and gathering spaces. The park includes the area's largest accessibility playground and outdoor picnic tables and seating at the Sprecher Brewing Outdoor Oasis. Visitors can enjoy live music events at the Johnson Controls Amphitheater or catch a Milwaukee School of Engineering (MSOE) or Nicolet High School home baseball game. The park is also home to the David Hobbs for the People Community Room and Orthopedic Hospital of Wisconsin War Memorial. Visitors can also access the Oak Leaf Trail Zip Line branch.

3. Old Milwaukee Town Hall

The original town hall building for the settlement of Milwaukee, built in 1872.

4. CITY HALL

Glendale's newly renovated, net-zero ready City Hall is the heart of the city's civic campus. Located along Milwaukee River Parkway, the civic campus is home to the city's essential administrative and public safety services like the Glendale Police Department.

5. BAYSHORE

Bayshore is a regional shopping, dining, entertainment, and lifestyle destination for the greater Milwaukee region. In addition to great shopping and dining, Bayshore hosts a number of festivals, events, and yearlong, family-friendly gatherings.

6. OAK LEAF TRAIL

The Oak Leaf Trail is a 125-mile multi-use trail system that connects bicyclists and pedestrians to Milwaukee County. The Zip Line and Milwaukee River branches of the Oak Leaf stretch through Glendale with multiple trail access points to allow residents and visitors to easily hop on and off the trail and explore what Glendale and Milwaukee County have to offer.
